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

Prior to being called Christians, Christ's followers were characterized as believers. Little by little, word-by-word, their faith became substance, and within one generation, regardless of the persecution, they turned the world upside down.

But, you can imagine there are hurdles to be bridged by faith. When a person becomes a Christian, they forfeit free Government handouts, but the blessings from Jesus far outweigh the help that the Government gives to Hindus. The next challenge is to help them understand that He is the ONLY True God.

Besides that, believers in India struggle to keep the Sabbath because if they don't work on Sabbath, they may not be able

to work for a while. It is difficult to make enough money to provide the food they need and they are afraid to trust God to meet their needs. Not so in Pondulu Paka, they keep the Sabbath holy; however, there isn't a church building to meet in. They meet in the church elder's home. A large tarp is put on the ground for ev-

eryone to sit on. At this time, the village people are allowing only Seventh-day Adventist Christians into the village. It is important that we erect a church soon. That building will only cost about \$3500.00.

Currently, we hold "Health Camps." Barbara will get a doctor to go with her and do health screening in the villages. In this way, the Communist party believes we are not there to exploit the people; but to help them. Barbara gives away as many medicines as she can get free from the Government. Everything we do is for Jesus and the salvation of a few (or many) needy souls. Lord, help us. ■

Japan Alive And Growing

Mount Akagi Institute has been a beacon of light in Japan for thirty-five years. Though it remains small (a reflection of the Adventist presence in Japan), it is nevertheless determined to make a difference.

Often, institutions search for workers to fill a specific need; but in this case, God saw the need and sent just the ones to fill it, Neff and Mayumi Acuna and their three children. After hearing about our work, Neff became more and more interested in the potential for developing a lifestyle and educational program. This work is desperately needed in Japan. So Neff became the director of promotion and development; and within one week, Mount Akagi accepted its first lifestyle guest—Carlos, the consul for the Paraguay Embassy in Tokyo.

Fasting, exercising, and changing his diet enabled Carlos to stop taking insulin; but more than that, participating in family worship and singing with the children gave his life a new spiritual perspective. He emphatically declared, “I will be back.” (Already, Neff has gone to Tokyo to meet Carlos’ friends and to help Carlos establish his new lifestyle at home.)

For two weeks, Marty Brown, the Mount Akagi president, and his wife, Mayumi, opened their home to an American couple from Okinawa. This couple needed to lose weight, control their diabetes, and choose a better lifestyle. The couple returned home rejoicing and committed to the new program they were taught.

With a new promotion and development director and the staff opening their homes, it seems imperative that the lifestyle center be refurbished to receive guests. Accordingly, plans for a mission trip to help has

In the community of Nacarare, there is now an established Adventist presence of twelve new members. Our desire is that the Holy Spirit will be poured out on the entire community and that they will accept the Lord as their Savior. When we gather for worship services, many people attend. Our hearts fill with joy and gratitude as we see what the Lord is doing in their lives and the transformations being made. Many no longer participate in the festive ceremonies where they dance all night to the beat of drums and drink tesquino. (Tesquino is a drink made from fermented corn.) Often they make up to 250 gallons, so that there is plenty for all – men, women, even children.

From November 10 through the 17th of 2012, I was invited to Ciudad Juarez to conduct a series of evangelistic meetings, entitled, “Health and Life in Christ Expo”. Four churches in the surrounding area helped test for diabetes, blood pressure, lung capacity, and body fat. We presented health classes during the evangelistic meetings. It was a great blessing to the people. Fifteen souls chose to follow Jesus through baptism.

Esmeralda Martinez was among those who

were baptized. From a very young age, she attended the Assembly of God Church and was not interested in studying the Bible outside of her faith. She believed she had received the Holy Spirit and that all other denominations were wrong. God, however, had other plans. One day, some Bible Workers arrived at her parent’s home. Her mother listened and realized the Adventist approached the Bible differently. She decided to begin Bible studies, and soon both Esmeralda’s mother and father accepted the Advent message.

Seeing her parents become Adventist troubled Esmeralda. When the Bible Workers came to study the Bible, she would not speak to them, but would retire to her bedroom. 

Each bag of cement costs \$14. To complete the next phase in building, we need 300 more bags. If each of us contributes at least ONE bag, we can make a huge impact on this project. We can assure that this school is built... ONE bag at a time.

Zambia, Africa Mission Trip

Purpose:

To build a much needed school and to conduct evangelistic meetings.

Educational opportunities are lacking for the children of rural Luapula, in Zambia. This school is not about making money, if it were, we would have considered building it in Lusaka, the capital city of Zambia, or in the Copperbelt province where there is more means. We intend that this school shall provide a clear divine plan by which those children who do not have the means to pay may still be admitted. Consider that, in Zambia, there are 467 primary schools, but only 26 secondary schools. That means that over 95% of the elementary children cannot be accommodated to pursue a secondary school. We feel a responsibility to provide that secondary education. The responsibility includes raising money, and building both a school and a church.

Together we can support this mission.

advances the financial needs rise. The folks from Colombia will need airfare, visas, and their living expenses paid the first year. These costs total up to \$3,200 per person. This will give the project time to establish new and stronger industries.

We are also raising money for a 4wd 50 HP tractor with a bucket, and miscellaneous construction, agriculture and maintenance tools. We lack about \$18,000 to finish reconditioning every building. We are trusting that God will open the windows of heaven and pour down his blessings! Thank you, dear friends, for your tireless support through the years, may He richly bless you. ■
